Exactly one year ago, Fern Lodge announced plans for expanding to care for 31 guests, and today we can gratefully report that by the time of our Annual Meeting on May 2nd, you will be able to inspect the completed project — rooms for six more guests, an enlarged and modernized kitchen and dining area, a nurse's lounge, a practitioner's room, a glassenclosed outdoor sun room, new offices, and many other helpful and attractive features. If you cannot visit us on May 2nd, do come soon — any week day from two to four is best.

Fern Lodge is constantly grateful for the support of the Field. Because of the many, many donations — both large and small — the receipt of several substantial bequests, the generous and whole-hearted work of many church members who have unselfishly contributed their time, Fern Lodge has been able in the past five years to spend more than \$150,000 in expanding and adding to the welfare and comfort of its guests — and all of this without borrowing a single dollar! But more still remains to be done to improve the lot of our nurses, and we solicit the continued loving support of the Field.

We are grateful beyond measure for the patient, loving and faithful work of our nurses and staff who day after day, month after month, minister to the needs of the guests, all of whom so greatly need nursing care. Truly they are living a life of Christian service.

Fern Lodge deserves and needs the continued metaphysical and financial support of the Field. At the level of costs today, no nursing facility that meets the standards of the Department of Care of The Mother Church can break even when charging the rates asked by Fern Lodge. We'll be sorry to see them all leave next month, but they will leave us with new spacious, attractive added quarters, ready to welcome six new guests.


For all this, we thank our many generous friends.

ANNA LISA AND ROBERT MCVEY

Two of our very cherished staff members are Anna Lisa and Bob McVey. These class-taught students came from widely different backgrounds to blend their talents at Fern Lodge, each bringing a high individual quality of thought and activity to the work being accomplished here.

ANNA LISA DARNELL McVEY was born into a Christian Science family, and attended Principia Upper School, graduating cum laude. Soon after having an article published in the Sentinel ("Why I go to Church," March 1972), she took class instruction. "It was a really neat experience that enlivened my sense of Christian Science healing," she says, "a great preparation for what was to come."

Among what came was enrollment in Fern Lodge's first Spring Adventure introduction to Christian Science nursing. Much prayer and revelation went into her growing appreciation of the place of the Christian Science nurse, and she began working at Fern Lodge as an Aide.

Living at Mustard Seed in Palo Alto and working at Fern Lodge made it a natural to share rides with Bob McVey, who was doing the same. It wasn't long before Board members and staff attended their wedding in a sunlit grove of Redwood trees in Marin County.

A year and a half of hard work at Fern Lodge culminated in her decision to take nurse's training at the Benevolent Association in San Francisco.

After earning her Practical Nurse pin, Anna Lisa requested duty once more at Fern Lodge. Patients and staff welcomed her with open arms. She also is the assistant librarian in her branch church Reading Room.

BOB McVEY'S story is a dramatic one!
After four years at Fern Lodge, Bob is now
the Assistant Administrator and Office
Manager, with intermittent volunteer
duties as painter, carpenter, electrician,
and occasional "mother hen" to the patients.
He is in the middle of a three year correspondence course for nursing home administrators, is the appointed chaplain at
Soledad Prison, was for a time the 11 pm
to 7 am librarian at the San Francisco



Airport Reading Room, and now serves one evening a week in his branch church Reading Room.

Life wasn't always this good or this productive. Eight years ago Bob was arrested and imprisoned for the fourth time, and soon sent to solitary confinement. Labeled incorrigible, he was allowed only religious books in his cell. One of them was Science and Health, and, through reading it, Bob was healed of the hard drug habit, with no withdrawal symptoms and no convalescent period. He applied for Mother Church membership, and was the very first person to be admitted while still in prison.

As proof was added to proof, the Chaplain arranged with prison authorities for Bob to visit branch churches in the area to share his healing experiences. As a result, he was paroled six years ahead of schedule. In short, he found himself at last, 'on the side of the angels' and dedicated himself to the service of Christian Science.

Upon parole, he was taken in by a Christian Science family, then moved to Mustard Seed, where he met Anna Lisa Darnell.

A friend on the Soledad State Institutional Committee introduced Bob to Emily Valentine in the hope that she could find work for him. Bob began his Fern Lodge career putting in two days a week in the office. Gradually his manifold abilities surfaced and were put to use.

So, we return to the two-fold story of Bob and Anna Lisa. The happy news now is that they are expecting a baby early in July, and have bought a lovely old house in Martinez.

FROM COTTON FIELDS TO CHRISTIAN SCIENCE NURSE

Our efficient, hard-working night-nurse, Mrs. Lossie Davidson, who holds the fort from 10 pm to 6 am five nights a week, remembers when she and her brothers and sisters as children used to be out in the cotton fields of Louisiana at 4 am and would work all day.

When a young woman in a small town in Arkansas she witnessed a remarkable Christian Science healing of a teen-age girl given up by the medical profession. This so impressed her and her widowed mother that they asked to be shown how to study the weekly Lesson-Sermon. They had a Bible, they purchased a Science and Health by mail for two dollars, and using old Quarterlies given to them, they began to study the Science that was to transform their lives.

Lossie followed a brother to Richmond, California, in 1955 where she finished high school at night, began to do nursing for patients of a Christian Science practitioner, and joined 8th Church, Oakland. Seven years ago she came to work for Mr. and Mrs. Cox, then owners of Fern Lodge. Christian Science Class Instruction followed. Living modestly on the premises while "serving the Lord" enabled her to afford a lovely 3-week trip to Europe in '72 and another to Africa in '75.

She is moving to Michigan very soon to be near two dear sisters. We will continue to be grateful for the midnight vigils of Lossie Davidson and her quiet loving care of her patients.
