An editorial in the June 23, 1906 Sentinel says, "Our annual communion and the dedication of the Mother Church are over, and this happy and holy experience has become a part of our expanding consciousness of Truth, to abide with us and enable us better to work out the purposes of divine Love."

At Fern Lodge, "the purposes of divine Love" are to make nursing care available to Christian Scientists, supporting and cherishing Christian Science healing, and making God's care available to humanity.

Fern Lodge is making a concerted effort to help patients expect to be healed in Christian Science by expanding their spiritual sense of themselves, and to be alert and active. We know you share our gratitude for the loving care our nursing staff gives. Their tender patience and firm stand for the recovery and health of the guests are inspiring. However, we now urgently need more Christian Scientists to help care for those who come to Fern Lodge. Both Nurses and Volunteers are needed to gently support the patients' prayers for healing and freedom. Our recently finished building addition and new equipment, paid for by your generous donations, have greatly enhanced our ability to serve "the purposes of divine Love." We are now able to accommodate three more patients and are enjoying the homey atmosphere of our new living room. Many beautiful pictures, donated or loaned by Fern Lodge friends have added to our homelike atmosphere. As funds become available we will renew furnishings in the guest rooms to improve their comfort, beauty and care efficiency.

As we have mentioned in previous newsletters we have been given funds from the sale of the Laurel Haven Sanatorium property with the stipulation that we use the money only to expand our facility. With the loving assistance of Phyllis Raymond, an Oakland real estate agent, and Eugene DeBolt, a member of the Fern Lodge Board, we have just agreed to purchase land adjoining Fern Lodge and we have applied for a permit to increase our capacity from the present 35 to 50. Building a new addition may start by June 1, 1985.

Fern Lodge is working closely with Arden Wood Benevolent Association in San Francisco to see that the needs of Christian Scientists for facility nursing care are met. Both facilities are taking this opportunity to reaffirm our unity of purpose in support of the mission of Christian Science nursing.

"The Promises Will Be Fullfilled"

On August 16th our staff was treated to an inspirational talk by Robert Koehler, a Christian Science Practitioner from San Jose, who brought us his prayerful insights from the practice along with his experience as Administrator of Twelveacres. His talk focused our attention on Mary Baker Eddy's assurance in Science and Health that, "The promises will be fulfilled." (S&H 55:21) The employees at Fern Lodge are asked to work hard daily, and at times they may feel there is no time to rest. Mr. Koehler reminded us that we can all "rest quietly in the assurance of being supremely loved." As John said, "We love him, because he first loved us." (1 John 4:19)

When our labors seem difficult, we can turn with trust to the promise in hymn 360 of the Christian Science Hymnal; "Is thy burden hard and heavy? Do thy steps drag wearily? Help to bear thy brother's burden, God will bear both it and thee." To help us counter the feeling that we are being asked to do too much, we were reminded that Mrs. Eddy has stated that "We are all capable of more than we do," (S&H 89:21-22). To understand our capabilities, Mr. Koehler urged us to compare it with the text in S&H, p.128, adjacent to the marginal heading "Practical Science." There Mrs. Eddy tells us that Christian Science can enhance our endurance and give us an ability to exceed our ordinary capacity. She says, "The human mind imbued with this spiritual understanding, becomes more elastic, is capable of greater endurance, escapes somewhat from itself and requires less repose." (S&H 128:11-14)

Another promise Mr.Koehler directed us to was in Science and Health, p.571 "Know thyself, and God will supply the wisdom and the occasion for a victory over evil." Our occasions for victory are supplied by God so we can accept them fearlessly, joyfully, knowing that the promise includes the wisdom to bring about the victory.

"Expect what you want," Mr. Koehler stressed, "courage is the remedy for discourage-ment." Remember, "with God all things are possible." (Matthew 19:26)



The day was divided into a morning talk, a buffet luncheon, and afternoon workshop with the patients and volunteers participating. The topics covered by the morning speakers were: "Learning How to Communicate With Patients/Helping Patients Communicate With One Another," Betty Dempsey, C.S.; "Assisting the Nursing Staff," Joy Zeller, Assistant Director of Nursing; and "Patient Activities," Elizabeth Stapler, Patient Activities Director. Then a workshop with patients and volunteers on communicating was conducted by Betty Dempsey. Mrs. Zeller followed with a demonstration of how to help patients with basic equipment like wheelchairs, etc. Volunteers next were able to demonstrate their new skills by bringing patients to the final workshop activity held in the dining room: an art activity given by the Activities Director, Elizabeth Stapler. June 9th was truly a day of joy at Fern Lodge. Patients, staff, and volunteers alike were busy (and happily so) sharing the volunteer workshop.


Nancy Bearden Graduates

Welcome Back



On the Frontier of Agelessness

Excerpts from Fern Lodge's Annual Meeting, May 1984 by Elizabeth Dempsey, C.S.

Greetings, fellow frontiersmen! Do you think of yourselves as spiritual frontiersmen? As Christian Scientists you are, you know. As active followers of Mary Baker Eddy's discovery, aren't you really on the frontiers of diseaselessness, sinlessness, agelessness, and deathlessness? Why call it a frontier? Well, it is in advance of others. We are going before our fellowman, preparing the way...

What is aging? It is just a general attitude of the world, a common opinion which accepts without protest the <u>notion</u> that there is <u>life</u> in matter, and that everybody and everything gets old and dies. Agelessness means the quality, state or condition of not experiencing limited existence.

Man is not <u>subject</u> to the passage of time, but is <u>master</u> of it. Time is a valuable possession; all human events take place in it. In Mrs. Eddy's definition of the word 'Year' she calls it: "space for repentance." We should see time as giving us <u>opportunities</u> to repent, to learn, to demonstrate, to serve, to enjoy Life! Eternity is the original fact, of which time is the highest human concept. "Enable us to know as in (eternity) so in (time) God is omnipotent, Supreme."

Let us turn our title around to express our frontier in a positive way. We are on the frontier of spiritual liveliness, spiritual powerfulness, spiritual purposefulness. I am going to touch upon four people we all know. People who made outstanding demonstrations over the belief of aging. Abraham, known as the 'friend of God', just got going at age 99, when he and his wife, Sarah, experienced spiritual name changes and the birth of Issac. Moses, at 120 years, "his eye was not dim, nor his natural force abated." John lived to be well up in his nineties, in safety, usefulness and great honor. Mary Baker Eddy, who in the last 45 years of her life discovered, founded and led her revolutionary religion. She was a wonderful proof of the power of Christian Science to maintain her in a good state of health and in full possession of her senses and sanity until her 90th year.

What did these four people have in common? They had receptive hearts; they were willing to listen for and obey the will of God; they knew God loved them, and they loved, adored and trusted God. They were do-ers, they had a sense of mission. God's purpose laid hold of them and sent them forth. One reason given for the process of aging is the accumulation of unresolved events. It is not the event itself which causes people to age unduly, it is the acceptance of the unfortunate aspect of an event, the failure to resist it adequately. Our four models had tumultuous and drastic events take place in their lives, but they handled them, learned from them, grew from them and then went forward wiser for the experience. Agelessness was a by-product of their attitudes, not their goal.

We must make the effort to be spiritually minded. The process of learning something of our spiritual nature each day makes us immortal. How do we get started on this? Jesus mentioned three ways: "Repent"; "Become as little children"; "Be born again."

I had the joy of a pre-schooler in my home with me for a week. It was an opportunity to observe childlikeness, the very quality needed to keep out or to remove the taint of aging. One thing I observed was her capacity to act at once upon what she understood; we call it spontaneity. The checking of child-like spontaneity slows much spiritual achievement. My guest was also innocent, pure, good, loving and gentle. Then there was a lovely trust. She didn't pretend to be self-sufficent when a challenge got too big. From that child-like dependence we can learn about complete surrender and trust in God, our ever available, merciful parent.

When I began this paper I was thinking of agelessness as it applies to persons. Then I realized that the attitude of mind I was describing accounted for the freshness and newness at Fern Lodge; and this lively attitude can be applied to our branch churches, or any other God idea that is seen to reflect His power. Remember it is the leading edge, this frontier of spiritual aliveness, and spiritual purpose-fulness. Christian Scientists are leaders of world thought, not followers of the world's small expectations. Do not be surprised at a whole new shape to your life, or your church, as you follow individually and collectively Jesus' directions to: 1) Rethink – stop and review, 2) Become as little children, 3) Be born again – experience a spiritual rebirth, hear the Holy Ghost talking to you. New fresh views will flow into your consciousness. New, useful ways to serve your fellowman will come in infinite varieties. You'll have no time for laying back, or retiring from usefulness, but instead you will be aflame, living purposefully, saying: "God, use me, what is Your plan for me today?"
