For instance, volunteers may think they are coming just to give — to give away their time and energy. But immediately they get into the real work, and what happens? Their giving comes back to them!



A group of Christian Scientists comes to conduct Wednesday and Sunday services at Fern Lodge.


Three of these readers shared their feelings with us.

Our Greater Community Responds

The Castro Valley Adult School has services available for nursing facilities in our area, and Fern Lodge has regular visits from some very loving teachers. They bring their blessing to us, and leave Fern Lodge touched and blessed, too. The following are excerpts from recent conversations with two such teachers.

"A co-worker told me what a wonderful place Fern Lodge was. I came with him just to play music, because it seemed like a pleasant thing to do. I came for the fun of it. And it was great fun. There is a beautiful feeling here. We played some violin duets that I had been working on. This was a chance for me to perform. I was amazed at how well the patients were treated, with respect, just like staff. When I had a chance to come and play I felt good. You people are happy here, and happy people are nice to be around. I have the idea that the staff is happy too."

This musician also played piano for Wednesday afternoon

testimony meetings at Fern Lodge and said afterwards, "I have a young, adult daughter who is emotionally and intellectually handicapped, and she came along one time. She found this a very peaceful thing to do. She even asked that I volunteer again so she could come back, and she still corresponds with the Activities Director. She loved what she was feeling and was really proud of herself when she was helping."

Another Adult School teacher said, "I teach at seven facilities. I have dropped all in Castro Valley except Fern Lodge. I am most impressed with the overall caring and warmth from the staff. Nurses stop and take time with the patients, instead of saying, "I can't right now," which I hear at other facilities. Also, at other places I can come and go without being noticed. Here I receive recognition and thanks from everyone."

This past year had many severe challenges for me and my family. As a result of great financial need, I was back in the job market. This time I wanted to be in a job centered around the demonstration of Christian Science. I found out about an opening at Fern Lodge by a letter they sent to branch churches. All I really knew about Fern Lodge was that it was a Christian Science nursing facility near Hayward.

After the interview I felt I really wanted to be a part of this activity, but arguments kept running through my mind:

- It's 55.5 miles from home.
- You have to earn much more than they can afford to pay you.
- · You will end up paying to work.

By the time I reached home, I decided to take the job. The thought of being at Fern Lodge made me feel happy and at peace. I knew anything God directs includes a sense of peace. This may sound like no big deal, except I worked in a Christian Science facility in the past and developed a negative attitude regarding facilities and Christian Science nursing in particular. The fact that I was willing to pursue the idea of working at Fern Lodge was remarkable.

I realized if God put me in this job, the supply my family needed would come in the way God designated. I didn't need to be concerned. The same day my husband told me about this job, work started pouring in for him. Mrs. Eddy states, "God does not reward benevolence and love with penalties..." (Misc. 199:1 - 2). This confirmed my decision to accept the position at Fern Lodge.

Since coming I've completely changed my misconceptions about nurses and nursing. I also have an opportunity to share Christian Science. Although the housekeepers are not Christian Scientists, several are interested. Three are reading *Science & Health* in their native languages.

The benefits of Fern Lodge are too numerous to recount in detail—here are a few. The arguments against coming have been refuted. The commute provides a quiet time to pray and set priorities. I've had physical challenges, but the love and understanding I've felt from the staff has always helped and often healed. The love I'm learning is too deep for words. I'm grateful for this opportunity to grow in grace.



Why Nurse?

There was a lively discussion at a recent nurse's staff meeting. Here are some of the ideas shared.

Christian Science nursing is evidence of an individual's deep love for God and man. Our Lord said to his disciples after he had washed their feet, "I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you. Verily, verily, I say unto you, the servant is not greater than his lord; neither he that is sent greater than he that sent him. If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them."

(John 13:15-17) Happy are ye if ye do these things! Many who are called to nurse do not at first understand what they are getting into, but as they learn what nursing is, they make the commitment that ensures their spiritual growth and their joy.

Christian Science nursing is an expression of gratitude. When nurses work with gratitude in their hearts, the work is joyous and harmonious, even when it seems difficult. The power behind nursing is Love itself. With Love as its source, nursing work is accompanied by an outpouring of love both from and to the nurse.

What about the "shortage of nurses?" We hear the question, "How can we attract more Christian Scientists to nursing?" Why don't we hear, "How can we attract more Christian Scientists to the practice?" The healing mission of Christian Science includes the call to serve mankind. Peter said, "As every man hath received the gift, even so minister the same one to another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God." (I Peter 4:10) What is the gift? It is the gospel of Jesus Christ, the good news that he, in demonstration of his great love for us, suffered and died and raised himself from death to ascend to heaven. This gospel gift includes the promise that we can follow Jesus, thanks to the grace of God that allows us to serve and to heal.

To provide enough nurses to meet the world's hunger for Christian Science nursing, each individual who has received the gift of the gospel needs to minister "as of the ability which God giveth." We strive to nurse using the ability God gives us each moment, and we accept each other's inspiration, and consecration. Rather than standardizing the activities that accompany nursing, we embrace, encourage and learn from every Soul-inspired expression of love that reaches out to comfort, help and heal.
