"Claim Your Own Experience"

Excerpts from a Talk Given at Fern Lodge by Marjorie Dagnall, C.S.

Claiming your own experience means knowing what that experience is and defending your right to have your *own* experience and not to be influenced by the experience of others.

Jesus is quoted in Matthew's gospel, "the harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few; pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest" (Matt. 9:37,38). It seems to me that the harvest has to be the acceptance of our own Christliness. The harvest must be our own true selfhood, our own experience. And you notice that we're admonished to gather, not to plant. We spend a lot of time planting. Jesus didn't say plant, — the idea was the field is white, ready for harvest. Go in and harvest! But how do you harvest? By using the qualities of God. It seems to me that the workers are the qualities of God expressed in individual thought.

However, sometimes we are inclined to let those qualities of thought be misused by viewing them as mortal tools. Then they are employed as human agents of willful thinking and are often brought in to defend past feelings and experiences which mortality attempts to push off on us as

ours. If these unillumined places of thought are accepted as our own, and if they gain acceptance in our thought as various unhealed, long-standing conditions of disappointment, sorrow or lack, we might feel some measure of defense is necessary to keep them from surfacing and causing us pain. So, sometimes we use human thinking to defend our "humanhood." We could view this as leaving "soldier-thoughts" to defend old unhealed wounds and beliefs. We then go forth to each day's activity with a steadily decreasing "work force." Why not call these human "soldierthoughts" home by giving the past back to God. From a fresh new start we can begin to use those qualities of God-like thinking right here and apply them to our present experience right now. Then we are actually claiming our own experience and harvesting the good already present in our experience.

More and more I'm seeing the importance of you claiming your own unique mission and going forward with a great sense of authority and power. The glory of Christian Science is in that wonderful sense that each of us follows our own path. And how greatly guided and shepherded we are during this unfoldment in which glory leads
