Christian Science Nursing and Training at Fern Lodge

REPORT FROM SHARON STRONG, DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN SCIENCE NURSING

What a fun-filled, busy year it has been, both with training online and in person here at Fern Lodge! I've been thinking a lot about a simple passage from 1 Peter. In a number of translations, a phrase here and there sweetly amplified the meaning, so I began combining them, which resulted in this new translation:

Here's my concern: that you care for God's flock among you, that God has entrusted to you, exercising oversight willingly, with all the diligence of a shepherd. See that your "flock of God" is properly fed and cared for. Not because you have to, as a duty, but willingly under God's direction. Not calculating what you can get out of it, but because you are really concerned for their well-being and because you are happy to serve. Not bossily telling others what to do, but tenderly showing them the way. 1 Peter 5:2

What a perfect description of Christian Science nursing in all its manifestations, from instruction in skillful care and ethical considerations, to ministering in supervisory and mentoring capacities!

Through the last year we have trained 15 students, and 7 of them now work at Fern Lodge. This included classes and experience in different levels of training, including supervision, mentoring, instructing, along with thorough reviews of skills and ethics, and also a bit of public speaking. We hope to help Christian Science nurses share the blessings, the joy, and the needs for nursing care in our communities everywhere. I was invited to work at Crystal Lake Camp in Pennsylvania for two weeks. What a beautiful and healing environment! Two of our students and two students from two other facilities joined me to gain experience working outside a Christian Science nursing facility

We are so grateful for our Christian Science practitioners, those who pray for their patients as well as our monthly house practitioners, who embrace us and the harmonious operations at Fern Lodge.

As you might imagine, having an average patient count of 18 throughout the year, there are numerous healings to report. Several patients were admitted who were temporarily unable to use the limbs on one side of their bodies. In a few weeks' time, all returned to home—two healed and one able to continue the healing at home with minimal assistance from neighbors and friends.

Our dedicated staff continues learning and growing in observation skills—our ability to see and love more deeply the perfect man when assisting patients who seem challenged with mental needs such as confusion or even angry outbursts. I call these "burning bushes." This careful observation and intuitive listening for what the patients are really needing is what Mrs. Eddy counsels us about: Observe mind instead of body, lest aught unfit for development enter thought. Think less of material conditions and more of spiritual. (Science and Health 419:16)

Watching what we think is a demand to accept spiritual reality, right where material conditions appear to human thought. This statement made by Mrs. Eddy to her household certainly applies to Christian Science nursing: "This work is not hum-drum, it is growth. It is repeating and defeating, repeating and defeating, repeating and defeating." (We Knew Mary Baker Eddy, p. 263).

The ministry of Christian Science nursing IS the embodiment of strong, scientific witnessing while tenderly caring for our fellow man.

The word "expand" kept coming to me and I felt in my heart that I was being called to respond. I tried to understand what that meant and why it was hard to dismiss the thought. While trying to figure this out to the best of my ability, I received a call from home informing me of my mom's illness. Serving as a Christian Science Nurse at the time and understanding that God is the source of comfort and care, I couldn't help but worry, my heart was troubled. There was an immediate thought to go home and take care of my mom. While contemplating the idea, I was led to listen to the Annual Meeting held by Fern Lodge in 2021.

The theme of the talk was Rise Up and Walk by Doris Geoff, after listening to the talk I felt uplifted and comforted. Three days after listening to the talk, my sister called and said Mom was well.

Mrs. Eddy writes: "In the dark hours, wise Christian Scientists stand firmer than ever in their allegiance to God. Wisdom is wedded to their love, and their hearts are not troubled." (Miscellaneous Writings 1883-1896, Mary Baker Eddy, p. 276:31)


I needed these words for my own mental housekeeping and to overcome my sense of self and the false responsibility of providing care. God is the source of provision and is accessible and available to everyone. Realizing that the only enemy is allowing worries in my own thought.

"The 'still, small voice' of scientific thought reaches over continent and ocean to the globe's remotest bound." (Science and Health, p. 559:8-10) These words from our leader's writings gave me comfort.

While browsing through advertisements from Christian Science Nursing Network, I read about Fern Lodge having a need. Moving to another state was not a thought I had considered. One Sunday morning, the word expand came very strongly once again as I was practicing and reading the Bible lesson for that week. The message I heard was "there is no perfect time to respond but now." I reached out to the administrator that morning, he sent me an application and scheduled an interview through Zoom. The Zoom call was more like a conversation about the love for serving our fellow man through Christian Science Nursing, that the work is more felt than seen.

Shortly after, I joined the family and group of Christian Science Nurses at Fern Lodge on October 12, 2022 under God's guidance. I'm continuing to learn how to trust fully and knowing the timing of things like the Director of Christian Science Nursing, Sharon Strong, said while engaging in each day's work.

I continue to cherish a statement from George Strong, "We don't care for people who only try to look good instead of doing the actual good." While hearing those words, I quietly thought to myself, "Yes, Lord, I am all in for this model of thought." Trusting the Divine Wisdom instead of navigating it humanly expands fully and it starts from within our hearts.



Music with Kirby

When one of our employees found out we were going to spotlight Kirby in an article, she said, "Kirby is one of the treasures of Castro Valley." That's exactly our sentiment when we think of Kirby and the 35-plus years he has been coming to Fern Lodge. He shows up with his guitar (or one of the many other musical instruments he plays) and comes with his deep love of sharing everything musical. It's wonderful to see him share his lifelong knowledge, experiences, and his deep appreciation of music history with our patients and staff.

Kirby always knows everyone's name, but he clarified that, "It's not just the name I know. I get to know the people who come and sit with me for an hour or two each week. It's very important for me to have a rapport

with everyone, and I work hard to really know them. That's who I am, and that's what I want to bring to evervone."

We feel that rapport whenever Kirby shares his appreciation of music. We feel that he has befriended our patients at the deepest level and that he is reminding them of their kinship with, not only music, but with life. Recently, one patient who arrived at Fern Lodge was unable to move her legs, but during Kirby's activity she was tapping her toes in perfect beat to the music he was playing. Another patient who was slow to answer any of our questions was always the first to shout out the names of the songs Kirby was asking the group to name. Usually, she spoke so quietly we could barely hear her.

Kirby has been part of the music scene since his early years, and not just as an instructor and substitute teacher. He played at Davies Hall with the Berkeley Symphony Orchestra and many other orchestras. "I was the guy way in the back that you didn't see," he said, "but I got to play with a lot of very good musicians." He was in musicals in the pit band, accompanied church choirs, and played the electric bass in some pop music groups and a country music band. One could sit down with Kirby and get a firsthand account of the music scene in the Bay Area through the years.

He has played the double bass, guitar, and the viola de gamba with others, including jazz groups. Back in the 70's, he played rock and roll in local bands at the Shadowbrook and Edgewater, both which are still there today. This just touches the surface of his cherished experiences of the music culture in our area.

His list of accomplishments and the musical instruments he has played could go on and on. Kirby has a great love of music, and of talking about musicians' lives and how their music came to be. This comes from his deep relationship to the soul of music. Kirby just simply loves music in all its expressions, and people seem to meet him in that divine place quite naturally.

Kirby still loves going to concerts and experiencing the life-giving spirit of whatever music he is listening. He told us, "Whatever I'm playing I really enjoy. In college I majored in classical guitar but the older I get, the more I just keep learning from everything."

Redwood Community

About 80 miles north of here is a small home with a generous front yard garden full of California native flowering plants.
